

CAR Survey Prioritization

We are asking conference participants—RD, ZD, and WB—to select up to five items in each of the following categories: new recovery literature, revised recovery literature, new service material, revised service material, and Issue Discussion Topics. If you choose more than five, the software will respond, “this question requires an answer.” You can advance when you select or remove items so that your list includes five or fewer.

You’re being asked to select what you believe should be included on the final CAR survey that will be published in the CAR and posted on na.org for Fellowship response. That means considering not just personal or regional preferences, but considering what would benefit the wide world of NA. Sometimes that means thinking about underserved or underrepresented populations. If everyone just prioritized their own interests, we would never have published IPs for “young addicts” or those with “additional needs.” Considering the needs of newer and smaller communities within our Fellowship is the responsibility of the conference as a whole. There are always more needs than can be met at a given moment. Which do you think are most important this cycle?
